#### What is the Aim of the Project?

## What Type of Participants are being sought?

We are seeking physiotherapists who treat patients with shoulder pain and hold a current annual practice certificate with the Physiotherapy Board New Zealand and practice in New Zealand.

We are aiming to secure a minimum of 311 responses.

By completing this survey, you will help us to identify current management of patients with shoulder disorders in New Zealand, and how confident physiotherapists are when managing patients with shoulder disorders. This information can be used by our profession to inform future research and training in New Zealand.

## What will Participants be Asked to Do?

Should you agree to take part in this project, you will be asked to:

- Complete an online survey (approximately 10 min) with multiple choices and some short answers.
- The survey will gather information about:
  - Gender, training, practice and caseload characteristics and sources you use to keep up to date with current best practice.
  - How you would diagnose and treat 4 theoretical patients.

Please be aware that you may decide not to take part in the project without any disadvantage to yourself of any kind.

#### What Data or Information will be Collected and What Use will be Made of it?

We will collect data about you and your clinical experience (i.e. gender, training, practice and caseload characteristics and sources you use to keep up to date with current best practice).

We will use group-level data for presenting overall findings.

The data collected will be securely stored in such a way that only those mentioned below will be able to gain access to it. Data obtained as a result of the research will be retained for **at least 5 years** in secure storage. Any personal information held on the participants [such as contact details, audio or video tapes, after they have been transcribed etc,] may be destroyed at the completion of the research even though the data derived from the research will, in most cases, be kept for much longer or possibly indefinitely.

The results of the project may be published and will be available in the University of Otago Library (Dunedin, New Zealand) but every attempt will be made to preserve your anonymity.

We will provide an electronic copy of the final report to all participants who you wish to receive this document, once the study is accepted for publication by a scientific journal.

You may withdraw from participation in the project at any time before submitting your response online without any disadvantage to yourself of any kind.
